The road ahead for Bethel?

The question mark in the title is there for a reason. Our Small group (Pastor Bram, Simon, Bert, Mike, Gloria and I) has been praying and thinking and conversing about our congregation for the past six weeks and prior to that as the Ridder team. It is time to present to the congregation what we believe is the God intended road ahead for Bethel. By listening to this presentation we hope to mobilize you into thinking and praying and conversing about Bethel **with** us and that together we may develop a new Mission and Vision for Bethel, in accordance with God's Will.

In order to determine where God wants us to go it is wise to establish first where we are today. We call that our 'Current Reality'.

Bethel started over six decades ago as a typical Immigrant church. Mostly new Dutch immigrants looked for a place to worship God in the Reformed tradition, much the same as they did in the 'Old Country'. The influx of immigrants was steady and growth of the church followed. Families were blessed with many children and the church continued to grow. There never was a need to look too far beyond our walls because growth was almost automatic.

Our Mission work consisted of mostly financial support of various local and Missions abroad, and of course, in good Dutch tradition, hard work at various local Missions. Most of us have never been too eager to go and share our Faith in a personal way with strangers, or even friends and neighbours.

Our Congregation was blessed and has been a blessing in many ways over those decades. However, reflecting honestly we must admit that some things have not gone so well. As a congregation we failed to instill the need in many of our children to worship communally and many even wandered away from the Faith. Families also became smaller and as a result we are now a very typical declining church. In our *Current Reality* we are not equipped to attract new members, and young families in particular.

There are many other reasons for the very typical decline that we are in: We all have witnessed our Canada change rapidly into what some call a 'Post Christian' society. Around us live thousands upon thousands of people who do not know Christ and do not even know what it means to be a Christian. Our children are bombarded with counter Christian messages and activities and most adults (including us) have found a busyness and level of distraction with modern life that has taken us away from what we know is most important.

The conclusion appears to be obvious: If we, as the Bethel congregation, keep doing what we have been doing and in the way we have been doing it, the writing is on the wall. The Question is: 'Are we OK with that?'. Our small group, through prayer and discussion, has arrived at our answer to that question. It is a resounding 'No'. We have come to believe that God still has a fruitful and wonderful future in mind for Bethel and we hope you will agree wholeheartedly.

At first glance the future may seem bleak but Christ still reigns! He told us that 'the harvest is plentiful but the workers are few'. All around us is a huge harvest, which includes our community as well as our children and our children's children. What we need to become is effective disciples in today's society!!

Some churches have understood this much sooner than we have. They were able to freely and objectively look at today's harvest and figure out how to convey Christ's message in a clear and relevant way to them. They were willing to lose any and all traditions that had become a stumbling block to the lost.

If we are to flourish again as a congregation we also have to shake off the old and start anew with the Gospel and Christ's leading as our only guide. None of our human traditions may hold us back in becoming a congregation who draws back those who have left and draws in those who have never heard.

As a small group we have read and studied some excellent books on why so many churches today are failing and what can be done to become an effective and fruitful church in this present age. We would love to share what we have learned in a Visioning meeting that we have scheduled for In that meeting there will also be plenty of time for discussion and sharing of ideas. We strongly encourage you to participate in that meeting! Your input and support is very much appreciated!!

Now, in preparation for that meeting and as food for thought let us present to you our preliminary thoughts on a new Mission and how we think we could accomplish that Mission:

Bethel's Mission statement today: Bethel Reformed Church is a family of believers committed to encouraging one another to boldly follow Christ, bringing the Gospel to a lost and suffering world. By using our God-given gifts and resources in obedience to God's Word, we will give Him glory!

Proposed new Mission statement: Sharing Christ in Community

We like this new Mission; it is short, simple and emphasizes our need to worship and serve our Saviour **communally** (together as a congregation) as well as our **responsibility** to share our Saviour with the **community** around us.

The following Vision for Bethel describes some ways how we will become an effective church in carrying out that Mission:

Vision: As a congregation, in everything we do, we will strive to be welcoming and compassionate to those who have none or limited understanding of Christianity.

Our Current Reality: For many reasons we have become a declining church which, like so many others, will struggle to be around in 10 years. In our current state we simply are not effective in carrying out our responsibility to be disciples and make disciples in the world today!

In our discussion time later on we can talk about some of the ways the culture around us has changed and why these changes require a different approach to discipleship.

God's Intended Future: We believe that God expects us to become relevant and effective in the culture, community and times in which we live. We strongly believe that our Theology is relevant today and will stand firm and unchanged. **What** we do as a church and **how** we do it, is what has to change so that we may reach and reap the harvest.

Proposed new Mission statement: **Sharing Christ in Community**

This new Mission emphasizes our need to worship and serve our Saviour **communally** (together as a congregation) as well as our **responsibility** to share our Saviour with the **community** around us.

The following Vision for Bethel describes some ways how we will become an effective church in carrying out that Mission:

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We will have a range of engaging and intentional small groups to help us grow in faith, wisdom and community.

In all we do we will be open to what is relevant and effective in the current culture, as long as it is in accordance with Scripture and our Reformed creeds.

2 Examples of how our church may change:

In the most recent RCA today was an article about Fellowship Reformed Church in Michigan, a church much like ours. Through God's providence and the Spirit's leading this church has become an incredible blessing to the disabled community in Muskegon.

For Bethel, God's intended Mission may be similar, yet entirely different. For several years now we have agreed as a congregation that Youth and young families should be our passion and focus. We have taken some small steps toward that and must ensure we continue to move forward.

God may already have presented us with a new opportunity; We have started to support Prince Charles School in various ways and it may have opened the opportunity to share Christ with many children and their (often single parent) families.

Since we agree that Youth and young families are our future, we should pay particular attention to what they have to say about engaging worship services, small groups and children ministries. If this means we have to leave behind some of our beloved traditions, we must be prepared to do so, if we like it or not.

We may have to abandon longstanding and very worthwhile missions in order to free up time, energy and resources for more effective and relevant activities for the here and now and the future.

3 The level of commitment it will take from us

As a congregation we have already reached a point where resources are limited. Those who are actively involved in the church are often involved in other ministries as well. Many of our members are 'advancing in age' and feel they have little left to give. Most who serve feel like they are already stretched to the limit.

When we commit to our new Mission and Vision we have to understand as a congregation that we also commit to:

- making Bethel a priority in our busy schedules,
- being intentional and strategic in our efforts to carry out the Mission,
- being helpful, positive and open towards our Mission,
- actively invite and try to involve friends and family in our church.

BETHEL REFORM CHURCH, 506 WEST STREET BRANTFORD ONTARIO.

Brantford is a city in southern Ontario with a population of approx. 100,000 people. It is surrounded by Brant county which has a population of approx. 40,000 people. HWY 403 runs through Brantford which gains you quick access to Toronto (1hr), Buffalo NY (1.5 hrs), and Detroit which is 3 hrs away. Brantford is also close to London, Kitchener and Hamilton. There is also the GO bus service link form Brantford to the Aldershot train station.

Brantford has lots of shopping including stores like Sears, Wal-mart, Zehrs, Canadian Tire, Lowes, Home Depot, and many others.

Brantford school boards include the Brantford Christian school (grades K-8). There is the Hamilton District Christian High School in Ancaster (28 mins from Brantford). The Grand Erie Board (Public schools) and the separate board.

Brantford has a wide variety of restaurants that serve Canadian, Italian, Greek, Chinese, Thai, Vietnamese, and Indian food.

Brantford has 1 University- Wilfred Laurier

Brantford has many parks and bike trails around the city that follow the Grand River which goes right through the entire city.

Brantford is also close to Lake Erie where numerous beaches can be found in Port Dover, Turkey Point and Long Point which can be reached from Brantford in under an hour.

The Sanderson Centre for the performing arts is a heritage theatre and concert hall. It hosts a variety of musical acts and theatrical performances throughout the year. Harmony Square which is located across from the Sanderson Centre has free skating in the winter and hosts numerous community events throughout the year. Earl Haig is a seasonal water park run by the city that all kids and adults enjoy on those hot days. There are numerous golf courses in the area.

Brantford has hockey, baseball, soccer, lacrosse and football leagues for all ages. We are the hockey tournament capital of the world!!!

Brantford is only 25kms from Countryside Camp (Camp Shalom).

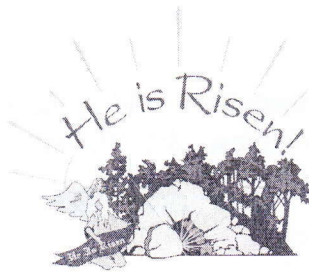
Brief History of Bethel Reformed Church in Brantford

To accommodate the influx of the many Dutch Immigrants in the late 1940's and early 1950's – home Church services were held weekly in Villa Nova with 5-6 families attending. A minister from St. Catherines came weekly to lead the service. This was continued by a lay preacher Mr. Neil Eelmon. As the Church attendance grew the families then met at Bealton United Church for their service. This was in the Waterford area.

At about the same time a group of the Reformed faith was meeting together in Burford which is now (maybe was then) the Rebekah Hall. Their attendance too was growing with the large families immigrating to Canada.

An amiable separation took place with the Burford group – half going to Woodstock and the remaining Burford families joining the Bealton families to worship together at the YMCA in Brantford. This was for approximately 3 years. When the opportunity was right the Church on Cayuga Street in Brantford was bought and services were held there.

In 1984 a new Church was built at 506 West Street in Brantford and the Cayuga Street Church was sold.
