Voices from Germany

A Syrian who had to flee tells us:

"I got to Germany in August 2015 via Lebanon, Turkey, Greece and the Balkan Route after a months journey. From Munich I was taken to Hanover and from there to a little village near the border to the Netherlands. Here I stayed together with twelve people from Syria in a house which was given to us. After two month I could join classes to learn the German language. I also join a band in my village where I play the drums. By this I got a little bit in contact with the people living here. In the meantime I got the legal status to be recognised by the authorities as a refugee. Now I would like to move to a city to make more contacts, also for playing music. I hope to be able to take more German classes and to be educated as a technician, maybe I even could take up university studies.

I miss my family and my friends. I hope they will stay safe. My friends, like me, also had to leave our country, otherwise we would have been recruited by the army. My friends live now all over in Europe and I am in little contact with two of them because they are in Germany."

One of our Pastors reports:

"We often don't get to know why the people have left and what they went through on their way. Sometimes, but only after a long time, and only when feeling safe, people talk about

themselves. Some are not only traumatised by the violence they have suffered before they got here, but by what they experience with our state and legal authorities.

A Syrian refugee, being with us since two years, opened up towards us. But he wouldn't do this in public. He says he regards his flight as a defeat. He feels ashamed for having left his wife and his children behind. He fears for their lives."

And we hear about a Armenian-Christian family coming from the region of Damascus:

"We lost our place in society in the conflict between Assad and the opposition. Now we don't belong anywhere. We have lost our future and, even worse, our children lost their future. That's why we left Syria, seeking a home for our family. And that's why we came to Germany.

Bremerhaven welcomed us and we met open and friendly people here. By now our kids go to school and we did find friends around, also in the Reformed Church where we just by accident passed by. They received us with warm hearts and now we join the worship services regularly. We feel accepted and regained hope for future times."

Voices from Syriah:

A young man who insisted on Staying in Syria:

Omar a young Syrian Engineer surprised his parents who are from the Presbyterian Church in Homs that he insists on holding his wedding in a church in Hamidieh, an area of the old city of Homs which was occupied earlier by the rebels and around 138 000 Christians had to flee without taking anything with them. Just as the Area was freed he insisted that his marriage will be held in a church that was damaged in war and partially rebuilt as a strong symbolism that life is stronger than death. In the wedding Omar stood to say that he is committed to this land and he will not give up in helping his nation in the midst of pain. He is dedicated to stay in the midst of lack of electricity and lack of basic living conditions and daily threat of war in the nearby streets. Although he has easy means to leave Syria but he insist on staying and encouraging other people in staying strong and holding on to their faith and hope.

A mother; a Refugee struggling

Rosa is a mother from Bloudan near Damascus feels like the numerous mothers whom the circumstances have driven them far, away from their loved ones. She had no choice but to travel to Canada. Every Morning she starts her day with the tears of sorrow for her homeland . She misses playing with her grandson, and hugging the other, and enjoying their faces. They are growing, while she is away. "Bodies separated afar, but hearts are still there " she says . She yearns for the noise of streets, and the sound of church bells in Syria. She prays full heatedly that the Lord will bring safety to her country and bring the scattered Syrians back home. Although she is a refugee but she waits for the moment when she can return home.
