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

Worship

Worship Service Details:

Morning worship services are held on Sundays at 9:30am. There are no regularly scheduled evening services; however, we do occasionally hold services in the evening for special programs and events.

Planning and Structure of the Liturgy/Worship:

Worship at Alger Park is characterized by meaningful liturgy that is casual and personal. We value a variety of music, both ancient and modern. We use music and liturgy to create an integrated theme in each service. Instrumentation is also blended, from organ to piano to violin, bass, and electric and acoustic guitar. We offer the music and liturgy both in a paper bulletin and on the projection screen for each service. Weekly communion and baptism remembrance are part of our worship.

We are blessed with many gifted members of the congregation who assist with planning worship and liturgy, and who play instruments or sing as part of worship teams. The live streaming and audio mixing are also managed by volunteers from the congregation. Until recently this work was spearheaded by our Director of Worship, a role we are in the process of filling again.

Alger Park Church joins the Holy Spirit in God's radical movement by creatively growing in and living out the gospel of Jesus where we live, learn, work, and worship.

Together we engage in worship, acts of service, generosity, environmental stewardship, community building, mentoring, and education. We are privileged to work with God in the Alger Heights/Garfield Park neighborhoods, in all the places we live and work, and around the world.

We seek to live out our calling to follow Christ in our <u>worship</u>, the way we engage one another in <u>community</u>, in our <u>discipleship</u> of all believers, and through <u>servant leadership</u>.

Alger Park's <u>worship</u> is an outpouring of love in response to what God has done for us. As a community of believers, our corporate worship transforms our individual lives and strengthens our life together.

In the gospels, Jesus says that the greatest commandment is to love God above all and your neighbor as yourself. Alger Park strives to follow this command in our <u>community</u>, both by deepening relationships inside our church and within the Alger Heights neighborhood.

Alger Park Church is a faith community that equips its body for <u>discipleship</u> in Christ. Made up of people at all ages and all different points along their spiritual journeys, we are a spiritual home where all are encouraged and enabled to take the next step along their path to becoming what God has envisioned for them.

Submission is not indicative of weakness or inaction, but of the ultimate form of action: trusting in someone and something other than, bigger than ourselves. Alger Park Church seeks to carry out <u>servant leadership</u> following the example of Christ in the way we organize and collaborate on the work of the church—with our pastors, staff, council, and congregation being accountable to one another.²

Our Strengths and Passions:

Alger Park is a welcoming community where guests are quickly greeted. We care deeply for one another and we do our best to meet each other's needs. We value strong preaching and active participation in worship. Many of our ministries are vibrant, and promoting community is a point of emphasis.

We are passionate about worship, local and global missions, and caring for one another. Increasingly, we desire deeper relationships with our neighborhood and greater involvement in justice issues.

Challenges In Our Church:

We have dealt with tremendous upheaval in the congregation in recent years. Like many, COVID resulted in a shift away from in-person worshipers, from which we have not fully rebounded. The impact, however, of the CRCNA's Human Sexuality Report (HSR) has been even more profound.

In the fall of 2023, after two years of faithful study and discernment, as well as extensive listening sessions, the Alger Park congregation took a vote regarding our stance on human sexuality. The motion from Council proposed that those in a committed, same—sex relationship be eligible to serve as office-bearers. Since this also required a change to the by-laws of the church, it required a $\frac{2}{3}$ majority for approval. The vote fell short by a slim margin, with over 60% voting in favor.

In the aftermath of the vote, roughly 30% of the congregation left Alger Park, including approximately half of council members. These departures consisted disproportionately of younger families with school-age children. Additionally, all five of our major staff have departed within the last two years—one before the vote took place, three in the wake of the vote, and one for unrelated reasons more recently.

Hope, and Goals for the Future:

Although the past few years have been challenging, we are hopeful for a bright future for Alger Park Church. Members have stepped up in leadership roles, we have greater audiovisual capacity for homebound members to participate remotely, and new members are joining. In particular, we are excited about growth in young couples just beginning families—by spring 2025 we will have more children 3 and under in nursery than we do in K-12.

Also, while varying views on the HSR remain, there is greater unity of vision than in the past. There is also a sense that ministries and congregational care, which have long been the life-blood of the church but which had been neglected due to our focus on sexuality issues, are once again taking center stage and revitalizing our leadership. Grief lingers, but excitement abounds as we move forward together with faith, hope, and love to discover how we will write the next chapter of our story together.

Though we desire a balance between staff-leadership and lay-leadership, we hope to fill the following positions in the near future:

As we fill these positions, we hope to be able to offer more robust children's ministries and develop new discipleship opportunities for adults as well.

Ecumenical participation:

We are an active part of Grand Rapids Classis South. In the past we have partnered with other neighborhood churches and are open to partnering again. We financially support non-profit neighborhood agencies and ministries. Attending believers are welcome to participate in our weekly communion services.

Describe what being Christians of Reformed accent means to you:

We value the priesthood of all believers and equipping our members to see the whole of their lives as being lived before the face of God, seeing everything they do as part of their ministry.

At our core, we are—collectively and individually—a living paradox: while we are more broken and helpless than we could ever imagine, we are more loved and accepted by Jesus than we could ever hope.

A picture of our community would show us, broken and hopeful, gathered at the feet of Jesus. We follow the word of God as expressed in the Bible, and our worship and work are animated by the Holy Spirit. We are and seek to be deeply connected to one another through our service, which flows from the love that Christ has shown us.

Describe your understanding of the relationship between the local church and the Christian Reformed denomination:

Local churches make a covenant commitment together to provide resources and support to seek the kingdom of God around the world in ways that the local churches cannot do on their own. We commit to shared doctrines and ministries, but each local church gives unique expression to that shared faith and commitment to seeking the kingdom of God.

As part of the Christian Reformed Church of North America, we respect, appreciate, and are committed to our denomination, while maintaining our respect and love of those with diverse experiences and perspectives. We treasure the unity we have in Christ and pursue the healing of division and fracture in our world, in our church, and in our own lives.

Identify some of the cultural challenges facing Christians and Christian churches today:

Cultural challenges abound and are both various and multifaceted: decreasing church attendance and participation, the increased prevalence of online worship and technology in general (AI, social media), positions on human sexuality, effective ministry to and with single adults, climate change, science skepticism, racism and anti-racism efforts, Christian nationalism, immigration and care for the disenfranchised, corporate and personal greed, the place of Christian education in society, the appropriate degree and orientation of political involvement for Christians, and perhaps most of all the church's struggle to seem a relevant and authoritative voice on these issues amidst the noise.

One common theme that unifies many of these issues is our need to strike a balance between standing strong in our convictions and allowing space for different kinds of people and perspectives in the church. In short, how can the church be both bold and welcoming?

Scripture exhorts us both to holiness (1 Peter 1:15) and to inclusivity (Galatians 3:28). We are to take seriously our obligation to teach God's truths as revealed in scripture (Matthew 18:6), but also to be open to the movement of the Spirit in unexpected ways (Acts 10:44-46). We desire to welcome everyone to the church, yet speaking boldly on the issues of the day—whether they be theological or sociopolitical—will always push some (perhaps many) people away. (John 6:66)

This is not a partisan problem or a culture-war issue; the church offers a challenge to all of us at some point, even in the midst of welcome. Perhaps a longtime member is irritated by a corporate prayer addressing climate change, or a visitor is put off by a sermon endorsing the orthodox view of sexuality. While we should seek to be winsome in dealing with sensitive topics, we must not shy away from them. For if our desire to welcome comes from a fear of offense rather than a scriptural understanding of love-in-action, members will not be challenged, and we'll have a church that doesn't bear the hallmark of the movement of the Spirit: transformation.

❖ A Snapshot of Important Events in Our Church's History:

Starting with a group of charter members of 62 families who lived in Alger Heights, Alger Park CRC was born in the early 1950's as an offshoot of Burton Heights and Seymour Christian Reformed Churches. Enduring a Christmas fire in the 1960's, Alger Park's ministries continued.

Part of the beginnings of Alger Park were creating Women's Guilds, young adult's groups, VBS, two morning services and an evening service, the Young Calvinist Convention, GEMS and Cadets, Women's and Men's Bible Studies, and Toppers for the mature members. These opportunities for spiritual growth helped develop a strong community. Because we are located in Alger Heights, our congregation has had a core of members from the neighborhood over the years.

Our congregation has been blessed with pastors who have stayed for lengthy periods of time. The pandemic strengthened our online presence but challenged our in-person worship attendance. Weekly communion and remembering our baptism began as a way of focusing on our unity in Christ during this challenging time.

Since Alger Park's vote regarding our position on human sexuality and the subsequent loss of many members, we have been reimagining what God's calling is for us as a congregation. We continue to welcome new members including young families, and we continue to reach out to our community through Kids Hope and Hand2Hand.

Just as Alger Park began with a core group of believers dedicated to God and building a place of community, Christian fellowship, and faith formation, our prayer is that we continue, Lord willing, to be a light in Alger Heights.
