Individuals with Disabilities Check List

At Disability Concerns (www.crcna.org/disability) our aim is to assist you, the church advocate, with your job in your church. You are so valuable! The following is a tool to help you in ministry with people with disabilities in your church. There are two ways to do this:

Best: You and an elder and/or the pastor sit down with the person with a disability (and his/her family), and talk through these questions. Listen carefully!

Second Best: Visit the person who has a disability (and his/her family). Listen carefully! Report back to the elders/pastor what you learned (with the permission of the person with a disability).

1.	Name the Disability
2.	Is there more than one disability?
3.	How long has this person had the disability?
4.	Is the condition stable, progressive, painful, unpredictable?
5.	Is the disability visible?
6.	Put yourself in this person's shoes. What type of effort do you think it takes for this person
	to come to church every Sunday? This may help put things in
	perspective for you. If you are an able-bodied person, it can be difficult to grasp the effort it
	takes to do a simple thing, like attend church.
	Would they need help with memoral come feeding?

- a. Would they need help with personal care, feeding?
- b. Would they need a ride to church?
- c. Can they get out of the vehicle and get to the doors easily?
- d. Can they open the door independently?
- e. Is the entire church accessible?
 - **bathrooms**
 - > social areas
 - > sanctuary, including the pulpit area?
 - > are there visual and audio aids available?
 - > are there cut-outs in the pews for wheelchair access?
 - when sitting in the cut-out area, can you still see the pulpit and/or screen?

7. Family

- a. Do they need help with some respite care?
- b. Would the family accept it, if it were offered?
- c. Would respite volunteers require training in the care they would provide?

8. Church Life

- a. What programs do you think this person could participate in?
- b. Would the program be accessible for this person?
- c. Does a program need to be created for this person?
- 9. Service...Everybody belongs, everybody serves
 - a. What opportunities are there for this individual to give back to the church/community?
 - b. What do you think they may be good at or would like to do?
 - c. What does your church need to do so that they can serve?

Some of the answers might raise your awareness about a deficiency in your church building or program. For example, perhaps this person could enter the church independently if the building had button-operated doors. Is this something that could be budgeted for in the future, or is there a government program with initiatives for building improvements? Act on it!
