9-11 Resources for Worship

The Event: The **September 11 attacks** (also referred to as **9/11**) were a series of four coordinated terrorist attacks by the Islamic terrorist group al-Qaeda on the United States on the morning of September 11, 2001. The attacks killed 2,996 people and injured over 6,000 others and caused at least \$10 billion in property and infrastructure damage¹ and \$3 trillion in total costs.

These immediate deaths included 265 on the four planes, 2,606 in the World Trade Center and in the surrounding area, and 125 at the Pentagon. The attacks of September 11, 2001, were the deadliest terrorist act in world history and the most devastating foreign attack on American soil since the sneak attack by the Japanese on Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941.

All of those perished were civilians except for 71 law enforcement officers and 343 firefighters who died in the World Trade Center and on the ground in New York City, one law enforcement officer who died when United Airlines Flight 93 crashed into a field near Shanksville, Pennsylvania, 55 military personnel who died at the Pentagon in Arlington County, Virginia, and the 19 terrorists who died on board the four aircraft. Overall, 2,605 U.S. citizens, including 2,135 civilians, died in the attacks but an additional 372 non-U.S. citizens (excluding the 19 perpetrators) also perished. More than 90 countries lost citizens in the attacks.

We pray for all who are no longer able to sleep in peace because they fear for their own life and for the lives of those near and dear to them; we pray for all who no longer have hope in your kingdom and for all who are tormented by anxiety or despair. Grant that they may be blessed

with faithful friends and counselors alongside them to comfort them with your strengthening gospel and sacrament. **Have mercy, Lord, we pray.**

A Prayer Litany for 9/11 based on Psalm 13

All: How long, O Lord? Will you forget us forever?

Leader: Lord, today we remember a day when everything changed. We remember a beautiful autumn day forever marred by smoke, chaos, death, and confusion.

All: How long will you hide your face from us?

Leader: We wondered where you were. We wondered how this could happen. So many innocent people gone. So many more left quaking with fear.

All: How long must we wrestle with our thoughts and every day have sorrow in our hearts?

Leader: We think of the children – now in their teens – who only know their dad through pictures and the memories of others. We think of the husbands, wives, mothers, father, sons, daughters, grandparents, siblings, and friends who miss that familiar face, whose gatherings are no longer complete.

All: Look on us and answer, O Lord, our God. Give light to our eyes.

Leader: We acknowledge that we don't understand, but we trust in you, Lord. We trust that you continue to work all things according to your purpose and that your Word and your plan will prevail. We know that "though the wrong seems oft so strong, you are the Ruler yet!"

All: Our enemies will say, "I have overcome them" and our foes will rejoice when we fall.

Leader: May we not give in to our fear. May we pray for our enemies and those who would harm us. May hearts of stone be turned to hearts of love.

All: But we trust in your unfailing love; our hearts rejoice in your salvation.

Leader: May we shower our community with love in your name. May we actively live the hope we profess.

All: We will sing to the Lord, for he has been good to us. Amen.
